YOUR CHILD'S FIRST DAY – FAQs

Transition Day: Friday 28th June 2024

We look forward to welcoming your child on this day, details as per letter March 2024. The details of the start of term will be published on our website and parents/carers will receive communication from the Principal prior to September.

Where should students go on their first day?

Students should arrive via the Academy main entrance and make their way to the Lawn. Staff will be at the main doors to welcome students and will direct them through to the Lawn area.

What time should students arrive for?

Arrival for all students is at 8.30am, your child will use the main doors into Reception to enter and exit the Academy.

What do the students need to bring?

Please bring all items required for a normal school day: bag, clear pencil case, black/blue pen, green pen, ruler, rubber, pencil, calculator, PE kit and trainers. Your child should bring a packed lunch if they do not wish to purchase food from the school canteen. We use a cashless system in the canteen. Money should be uploaded onto your child's account in advance. Parents/carers will be notified of how to do this in due course.

What will students do on the first day?

Students will spend time with their tutor, have photos taken and learn about how their timetable, ASPIRE and FIC cards will work on a daily basis. They will also experience some lessons and meet some of their teachers.

What happens at lunch?

Please bring either a packed lunch or money to purchase lunch from the canteen on the first day. Your child will not need money to purchase food if you have already put money on their online account. Year 7 will be given priority to access the canteen for the first week and will enter the canteen early to ensure that they feel comfortable and confident with the system. If students had free school meals at primary school, and we are notified of this information, they will have their account credited online with a daily allowance.

What will students study in each subject?

Please refer to the school website, using the 'Students' tab and then select the relevant 'Area of Learning'. You will be able to click on each subject and the Key Stage 3 curriculum outline will be viewable.

Is uniform required?

Full uniform must be worn. Please see the uniform guide within this booklet and details are on our website under the 'Parents' tab.

The academy day varies slightly on each day, with finish times differing throughout the week. Within the academy day, all students work on a two week timetable, Week A and Week B. Each tutor will explain how this will work in none actual on the distance. Example timetable:

Misst

The Bourne Academy is one of two schools, in the south of England, to benefit from an "exciting" initiative organised by the Music in Secondary Schools Trust (MiSST). From its start in September 2022 the programme sees every Year 7 and Year 8 student given a classical musical instrument to learn during music lessons as well as in MiSST funded extra lessons. Students are also able to participate in concerts alongside other schools across the country. MiSST is taught within normal music lessons, while peripatetic staff teach students in violin and flute.

Students receive a minimum of two years tuition and follow the set curriculum, named The Andrew Lloyd Webber Programme, which has had a significant impact on the lives of so many children around the country.














ASPIRE

Students will develop into literate, numerate, global citizens who ASPIRE. Students are assessed through subject-led ASPIRE Days where they spend the day working in teams on various projects, as the curriculum is taught through the Academy competencies:





There is one ASPIRE Day scheduled for each term, these are centered around set themes with activities that develop the ASPIRE competencies.

REWARDS

ASPIRE REWARD CARD

In 2023, we introduced the ASPIRE Reward Card, which works alongside students' First Impression Card. The ASPIRE Reward Card recognises positive behaviours and encourages students to display our ASPIRE competencies during social times, around school, at ACE clubs, or when representing the Academy. Students will aspire to reach "The 1000 Points Club." At each 1000 points milestone, students will be presented with their House Point pin badge.

ASPIRE AWARD

The ASPIRE Award has three levels; bronze, silver and gold. All students will start by completing bronze, and work through the Award levels during their time at the Academy. A suggested task list has been created with Student Council and teachers, but if students are involved in an activity that is not listed, either in school or outside of school, then students should enter the evidence in the 'Supporting Statement' box on each page of the evidence portfolio.

HOUSE POINTS

Our house points system, aligned with the Student Behaviour Policy, aims to recognise and celebrate student achievements in various areas. We prioritise acknowledging excellence through regular praise and a reward system agreed upon by both students and staff. The Rewards Policy encourages our ASPIRE ethos, fostering personal responsibility in habits and behaviours. Points are allocated across categories such as Academic, Character, Pastoral, and Homework, each rewarding exceptional efforts. Academic achievements, character, pastoral contributions, and diligent homework all earn points, ensuring a rounded approach to student recognition.

- In September 2010, the newly renamed 'The Bourne Academy' opened.
- The Bourne Academy is an all-abilities state school for boys and girls aged 11 to 18 years old.
- The Academy's specialisms are Engineering & Design and English.
- Each House is run by a Head of House who offers pastoral care and support.
- Each House has several tutors. Each tutor group has a dedicated tutor.
- The Academy is set in over 23 acres of grounds, 6km north of Bournemouth Town Centre and the site includes sports fields, a MUGA with astroturf and floodlights, a wooded copse, trim trail and a lake for Outdoor Education use.

Uniform:

- Black logo'd regulation Academy jacket* must be worn at all times in the Academy
- Pink regulation Academy blouse* or white shirt (tucked in) with a regulation House tie*
- Black and pink knee length Academy skirt* or black school trousers (not tight/stretchy material)
- Black socks or tights and plain black leather or leather look flat shoes (no/low heels, no trainers and no decoration/logos)
- PE Kit Black & pink regulation Academy sports shirt*, black shorts/skort or black sports leggings or track suit bottoms, and trainers.

Optional extras:

- Black Academy jumper with pink piping*
- For PE: Black or pink hooded Academy sweat-top*, mid-layer fleece* (PE/Outdoor Education), waterproof jacket and trousers, own plain dark coat
- Dance kit—Black/purple/white t shirt with sleeves, black leggings or black tracksuit bottoms.

In Addition:

- Only natural make up and natural hair colour is permitted at the Academy. No fake eye lashes
- Coloured nail varnish and artificial nails are NOT permitted
- Jewellery is to be kept to a minimum, with only one stud earring in each ear and a watch permitted
- Visible facial piercings and stretcher earrings are not allowed and students will be asked to remove them. Retainers are not allowed regardless of colour or if clear

Equal Opportunities

MEDICAL

At The Bourne Academy, Mrs Copelin-Irvine is our First Aid Lead and can be contacted by e-mail (rachael.ci@thebourneacademy.com) or by telephone 01202 528 554. Mrs Copelin-Irvine and her team are able to treat minor injuries which inevitably happen from time to time. If your child becomes unwell at school and needs to go home, you will be contacted using the telephone number on your student information record form. Where possible, please give the school alternative numbers along with a mobile. Students' medication can be kept in a secure storage with arrangement with Mrs Copelin-Irvine, students should not be carrying medication on their person and this should be handed to Reception, preferably by an adult. Children should NOT call home from their mobile phones if unwell.

STUDENT INFORMATION

The Bourne Academy has a 'no mobile phone' policy, so please make sure that all mobile phones are switched off and kept in your child's bag during the school day. Headphones are also not permitted for use at school. Students should not bring valuables to school. Students are required to carry their belongings around with them during the school day, although we do have some lockers available for hire. Therefore, please ensure your child's bag is robust and strong. Please ensure that all clothing, PE kit, coats are all named. This will ensure that any misplaced item can be returned directly to your child.

At the beginning of the academic year, students will be given a Student Planner which will help them to plan their work. Parents are expected to monitor and sign Student Planners weekly. The Student Planner, ASPIRE and FIC forms part of student's essential equipment.

Years 7, 8 and 9 students will be issued with a booklet of curriculum Knowledge Organisers. They contain vital 'must know' information. These Knowledge Organisers underpin what you learn in lessons and your homework tasks.

The 'Show My Homework' app is used to record home learning tasks and submitting completed independent learning.

Parents/carers will receive further information about this.

OFSTED

Our OFSTED report clearly shows the quality and high standard of education at The Bourne Academy. We look forward to an exciting and successful relationship with you over the next five years. Below is an extract from our last Ofsted report:

OFSTED 2019

The Bourne Academy is a welcoming and inclusive school. Pupils and staff are proud to be members of the school community. The views of many pupils are reflected in the comment made by one, who said, 'The school helps me to be the best version of myself.' The school is a calm place to learn. Pupils are respectful, friendly and polite. They look out for each other and look after the school environment. They feel safe and supported by school staff. Bullying is rare, and staff deal with it well. Staff model respectful behaviour and pupils respond positively. Leaders' ambition for pupils to aspire runs deeply throughout the school. It is reflected in the design of the curriculum and pupils' subject choices. Leaders reward pupils for improving their work and attendance. The school values its many clubs and extracurricular opportunities. Recitals and performing arts activities are well attended by pupils and parents. Pupils are proud of the Greenpower Club's success as international finalists at Silverstone racetrack. Staff know their pupils well. Teachers support pupils when they are unsure about their learning. Pupils now know and remember more in their time at the school. This is helping them to achieve.

STUDENT BEHAVIOUR POLICY

The Student Behaviour Policy focuses on positive behaviour which supports learning and promotes, celebrates and rewards achievement. We rely on students being self-motivated to keep themselves, and their peer group, concentrating and fulfilling their potential at all times. The Academy thrives on an ethos of mutual respect amongst all staff, students and parents/carers — everyone has a clear understanding of the procedures and sanctions which keeps everyone learning.

Detentions

The teacher will give a detention on the next available day if a student:

- Receives a GREEN slip (and are removed from the learning environment)
- Has not handed in homework by the advised deadline or if it is deemed as 'incomplete'.

The detention is set, and parents/carers are notified by TEXT message. Provided parents and carers have kept their contact details up to date with the Academy, the message will be generated as the detention is set. The detentions will always be after school. During the detention, the student is required to reflect on their conduct and develop strategies to prevent future sanctions of the same type.

Students who fail to attend a DOL Detention will be set a 2.15hr Principal's detention on a Friday. Students who miss a Principal's detention on a Friday will be escalated as per the Academy's Behaviour Policy.

Punctuality to School

Students who arrive late for school (after the morning bell) will gain their morning attendance mark via the late room. This is located in the Reflection Room (Reflection). Punctuality is important; however, we recognise that on rare occasions there could be unexpected circumstances that cause delays in the morning. Two instances of lateness each half term is deemed acceptable. Therefore, if a student is late more than twice, they will be required to complete 5 lessons in our Reflection Room. They will also be issued with a two-hour Principal's detention, after school, on the next available Friday.

Lateness to Lesson or Line Up

If a student is late to lesson without a good reason, the class teacher will strike the student's 'First Impressions Card' (FIC).

First Impressions Cards (FIC)

A First Impressions Card (FIC) will be fixed into the school planner – this is a system whereby students are recognised and rewarded for meeting our expected 'first impressions'. Students are required to always have their planner and FIC on them whilst in the Academy. Students who forget or lose them will work in our Reflection Room, whilst every effort is made to locate them (including contacting home to support if appropriate). FIC cards are reviewed weekly in tutor time and those students who have not incurred any strikes will received positive House Points from their tutor. Students who fall short of the expected standards on uniform, equipment, punctuality to lessons and line ups, conduct in/around the Academy and at social time, will be allocated strikes on their card – a 5th strike would result in time working in the Reflection Room for five lessons. Refusal to hand over a FIC when requested would also result in the same sanction. FIC cards will be reissued at the start of each half term.

Breaking other rules in the Academy

- If a student is defiant, eg. walks out of a lesson, refuses to hand over a mobile phone or personal music device, they will be GREEN slipped. If the defiance continues the student may be suspended.
- If a phone is confiscated, this will be placed at the Academy Reception where the student will be allowed to collect it, at the end of the day. Repeated incidents of this type will result in the student not being allowed to bring their phone into the Academy.
- If a student is highly aggressive or threatening, swears at an adult, or severely disrupts the learning of others, they will be suspended.
- If a student uses inappropriate language in earshot of an adult around the Academy, they will be reminded of the Academy expectations surrounding respect via an educational conversation. If the student continues, this will be seen as deliberate use of offensive language, appropriate sanctions will then be issued, the most serious of which could result in a suspension.
- If a student misbehaves at social time, they will incur a strike on their FIC; repeated behaviour of this type could result in a loss of social time (LOST) for a set period of time in the Reflection Room.
- Students who continually fail to follow Academy expectations around behaviour, will be placed in the Reflection Room for an extended period of time. This will be at the discretion of the Leadership Team.
- Students who forget to bring their planner will be in the Reflection Room until rectified.


- Students who arrive wearing incorrect uniform will be in the Reflection Room until uniform is rectified. This includes trainers, false nails, false eyelashes
- Minor uniform misdemeanours such as untucked shirt, inappropriate skirt length would incur a strike on a student's FIC.
