

DANCE AND THE PERFORMING ARTS AT THE BOURNE ACADEMY

Key Stage 4 Year 9

In year 9 students begin to study BTEC Level 2 Tech Award in Performing Arts (Dance). Students look at developing interpretative and physical skills used in a live performance because we believe that these skills are important for preparing for any future courses within the Performing Arts Industry.

While studying Dance students will develop and gain knowledge in how to perform the movement used in dance styles such as Musical theatre, Contemporary, Street Dance and Physical Theatre. All students who study dance are encourage too perform in the Annual Dance Evening and Rock Challenge.

Key Stage 4 (Years 10 & 11)

Students will learn how to plan, develop and organise a Dance performance in a variety of contexts throughout the two years. The BTEC course is divided up into three units.

Key Stage 5 (Years 12 & 13 – 6th Form)

In Key Stage 5, our students follow the BTEC Level 3 Extended Certificate in Performing Arts. The BTEC course is designed for people who are passionate about a range of Performing Arts. This course is mainly practical and you will learn through practical workshops and performances. This course is equivalent to one A-Level and is a two year course.

Units include:

Investigating Practitioners' work (externally assessed)
Developing Skills and Techniques for Live Performance
Group Performance Workshop (externally assessed)

Plus one other unit from a range of Performing Arts genres (Unit chosen will be Dance)

This course is designed to prepare students for a vast range of jobs in the Arts performing front or back stage. BTEC Level 3 courses are valued by employers and higher education (Universities, colleges and accredited Performing Art schools.) It also provides students with the opportunity to develop a range of skills and techniques, personal skills and attributes which are all essential for working life in general.

Gold Arts Award (16 UCAS Points)

Gold Arts Award develops creativity, communication, planning, teamwork and leadership skills. The award is also recognised on the UCAS Tariff. If you have an interest in Dance, Drama, Music, Art, Photography and Media then Arts Award would be suitable for you. You can take the qualification once you are in Year 12 or 13 and it is completed in one year.

Units include:

Gold has two units: Unit 1: personal arts development Unit 2: arts project leadership.

Employers, universities and colleges know that Arts Award is a qualification that shows young people's level of commitment and progress in the arts, and in developing new skills.

Dance Industry Links

The Bourne Academy is part of the Associate Schools programme for Pavilion Dance. This link allows students access to free theatre trip performances, working with professional artists and having regular visits from the staff from Pavilion Dance who mentor and support students interested in the industry. Students are encouraged to visit the centre and are given opportunities to work in the theatre. A number of our students perform with local Dance Companies such as Missfit, Team Rockit and Shake.

At the Academy students are given a number of Dance opportunities to perform. Our Bourne Movement Crew open the BTown Throwdown festival on the terraces outside Pavilion Dance, our gifted and talented dancers were involved in the Super Crew for the Breakin Convention. Students have been selected to work with professional artists Tony Adigun from Avant Garde and Renaud Wiser. We also have regular Dance companies Misfits, Team Rockit, Zoelogic and Fuse8 working within our curriculum.

Regular theatre trips take place to a number of venues in the local area and further afield such as the Mayflower, Southampton and London. We work closely with AUB who offer a Dance degree programme and visit the students to keep them up to date with the Industry. This year we plan to run a trip to Move It the largest Dance festival in England which is a great day out for students to meet and see Dance at a professional level.

• Businesses are more likely to hire someone with a theatre degree as opposed to a business degree, because a theatre background suggests that someone can sell themselves and their products;
