

Animal Farm – George Orwell

- Published in 1945 Animal Farm is a novel about a group of animals who take control of the farm they live on. The animals get fed up of their master, Farmer Jones, so they kick him out. Once they are free of the tyrant Jones, life on the farm is good for a while and there is hope for a happier future of less work, better education and more food. However the struggle for power between 2 pigs soon escalates and threatens to jeopardise life on the farm.
- Main Characters Old Major, Napoleon, Snowball, Boxer, Mr Jones.
- Animal farm is an allegory, reflecting the events of the Russian revolution in 1917.




The Lion, The Witch & The Wardrobe – C.S. Lewis

- Written in 1950 The Lion, The Witch & The Wardrobe is set during the World War II bombings of London. Four English siblings are sent to a country house where they will be safe. Whilst investigating the house Lucy finds a wardrobe that transports her to a magical world called Narnia. After coming back, she soon returns to Narnia with her brothers, Peter and Edmund, and her sister, Susan. There they join the magical lion, Aslan, in the fight against the evil White Witch, Jadis.
- Main Characters Lucy, Susan, Edmund, Peter, Aslan, The White Witch.
- The Lion, The Witch & The Wardrobe is a fantasy novel from the collection of works 'The Chronicles of Narnia'




Lord of the Flies – William Golding

- Published in 1954 Lord of the Flies is set on a remote island and shows how a group of stranded schoolboys go from civilisation to savagery in a very short space of time. We follow their story as they try and survive with no adults, with some characters making shocking choices along the way.

The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night time – Mark Haddon




Pig-heart Boy – Malorie Blackman

- Malorie Blackman's focuses on the social and ethical issues of transplanting vital organs from human to human and animal to human.




Malala – Malala Yousafzai


Myths, Murders and Mysteries – various authors

Hidden Figures – Margot Lee-Shetterly

- Hidden Figures was published in 2018. It tells the story of three African-American women who worked as 'computers' to solve problems for male engineers and others male bosses at NASA. For the first years of their careers, the workplace was segregated in addition all women were kept in the background. Author Margot Lee Shetterly's father was a research scientist at NASA who worked with many of the book's main characters.

- This is a British 'young adult novel'.



The Life of Pi – Yann Martel


- The Life of Pi is a Canadian novel published in 2001. The protagonist is Piscine Molitor "Pi" Patel, an Indian Tamil boy whose parents own a zoo. He survives 227 days after a shipwreck while stranded on a lifeboat in the Pacific Ocean with a Bengal tiger which raises questions about the nature of reality and how it is perceived and told.
- Main characters are Pi Patel, the narrator, Richard Parker (aka Thirsty), Orange Juice the orangutan, Pi's family; Santosh Patel, Ravi Patel, Gita Patel.
- The Life of Pi has been described as a "headscratching combination of dense religious allegory, zoological lore and an enthralling adventure tale, written with warmth and grace".

Jungle Book – Rudyard Kipling


- Rudyard Kipling wrote Jungle Book in 1892. His travels throughout that vast region, as well as his time in Southeast Asia, strongly influenced his perceptions of native cultures. Those perceptions, however, were, in turn, viewed through the prism of British imperialism that, by nature, subjugated less-developed nations while imposing British customs and practices on to indigenous peoples.
- Main characters are Mowgli, Baloo, Bagheera and Shere Khan.
- Jungle Book was inspired by and written for children. Kipling is believed to have had his young daughter in mind when he wrote it. Her name was Josephine, she tragically died at the age of six.


Stormbreaker – Anthony Horowitz


Oranges in No Man's Land – Elizabeth Laird


A Little Piece of Ground – Elizabeth Laird


Millions – Frank Cottrell-Boyce


The Penguin Book of Modern Short Stories - Various


We are all made of molecules – Susin Neilsen


Word Nerd – Susin Neilsen


My messed up life – Susin Neilsen


Refugee Boy – Benjamin Zephaniah


