WALTER THE WATER DROPLET

Year 7 science students were tasked with writing a short story for 'Walter the Water Droplet'. Well done to Riley FG, who wrote this wonderful story below:

In a sea far, far away, there was a water droplet called Walter, he lived at the bottom of the Pacific Ocean. He is made up of two hydrogen atoms and one oxygen atom. He had been living in the ocean for 1000 years until... a deep-sea dweller. A deep-sea dweller swam towards his food that Walter had been coincidentally next to. It had swallowed Walter.
