BUILDING CHARACTER - ASPIRE

At The Bourne Academy we are committed to creating well rounded students who are well prepared for their futures. We deliver a variety of lessons, workshops, trips, activities and interventions to help support our ASPIRE ethos including three ASPIRE days each year. ASPIRE stands for Ambitious, Self-Confident, Physically Literate, Independent, Resilient and Emotionally Literate.

Students will develop into literate, numerate, global citizens who ASPIRE. Students are assessed through subject-led Aspire Days. They spend the day working in teams on various projects, as the curriculum is taught through the Academy competencies:

Ambitious Self Confident Physical Literate Independent Resilient Emotionally Literate



The ASPIRE Award is all about helping you to develop your character by focusing your mind on getting involved and making a positive contribution.

The ASPIRE Award has three levels, bronze, silver and gold. All students will start by completing bronze, and work through the Award during your time at the Academy.

There is one Aspire Day scheduled for each term, these are centered around set themes with fun activities in each subject area. Some examples of previous themes are, World Book Day, Ambition and Conservation. Our most recent ASPIRE day focused on developing the physical literacy and self-confidence of our students. All students were able to choose from a range of activities including a sporting challenge, develop their creative skills and try new activities.

Music in Secondary Schools Trust

The Bourne Academy is one of only 29 schools nationwide selected for the MiSST programme (Music in Secondary Schools Trust).

The programme, supported by Lord Andrew Lloyd Webber provides every child in Year 7 & 8 with a personal instrument. Students have regular tuition as part of their curriculum, they also perform in concerts both in the Academy and at external venues. The Trust aims to transform young peoples lived though classical musical education.

ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY

GENERAL ATTENDANCE:

In preparing students for adult life we make no apology for having such a stringent and tough approach to student attendance. Students should attend 100% of the time, however a minimum of 97% is expected. Places at colleges and opportunities in employment are becoming increasingly competitive and key skills include reliability, good attendance and punctuality. Therefore we need to set high standards at this stage to give students the best opportunities in their adult life.

REWARDING POSITIVE ATTENDANCE:

We are investing in positive attendance. All students with 100% termly attendance will receive a certificate and reward. All students with attendance of 97% and above will receive a postcard and small reward at every half term.

PUNCTUALITY:

At The Bourne Academy, constant lateness is unacceptable and not only disrupts the first class of the morning but also means that children miss out on a structured start to the Academy morning. Parents/carers are responsible in law for ensuring that their child arrives at school punctually. Students arriving after 8.40am must have one of the following:

- A note from parent/carer advising why the student is late.
- A late pass which must be shown to the Head of House on duty.

Students who arrive late without a note, or a late pass, will receive a late mark. On the third occasion they receive a Principal's detention and a day in the Reflection Room.

In addition, students arriving late without a note, or late pass, will be recorded as an unauthorised absence. If a student has ten or more unauthorised absences within a six week period, the Academy can take legal action which may take the form of a Penalty Notice from Bournemouth Borough Council.


CHALLENGING POOR ATTENDANCE:

The Bourne Academy will not tolerate persistently poor attendance levels and has taken a number of measures to challenge poor attendance of individual students. This includes applications made to Bournemouth Borough Council for penalty notices to parents/carers of students with persistently poor attendance. Penalty notice applications will also be sought for any unauthorised holidays taken during term time without the written permission of the Principal. This will only be granted in the most exceptional of circumstances, so please bear this in mind when planning holidays.

Presentation At The Bourne Academy

- I will use a pencil to draw lines, drawings, graphs and tables.
- I will write in blue or black ink.
- I will write the title starting with a capital letter.
- I will write the dates every lesson.
- I will underline my title and dates with a ruler.
- I must not graffiti on books or folders.
- I will use capital letters for my own name and my teachers' names.
- I will glue or file any loose sheets into my book or neatly in my folder.

- My handwriting will be to the best of my ability, I will make it as neat as I can.
- I will cross out mistakes with a single line; there will be no scribbles in my work.
- I will start my writing against the left hand mar-gin. I will neatly draw a margin on each page if a book does not have one.
- I will not leave spaces and will use both sides of the pages in my exercise book or loose paper.

Please note:

- Black blazer branded with logo must be worn at all times in the Academy
- Shoes must be leather/leather look in line with Academy policy (no trainers)
- Only natural make up and no fake eye lashes
- Hair styles should not be extreme (including no shaving below a grade two) and be of a 'natural colour'.
- Coloured nail varnish and artificial nails are **NOT** permitted
- Jewellery is to be kept to a minimum, only one **stud earring in each ear** and a watch. Visible facial piercings and stretcher earrings are not allowed, and students will be asked to remove them, this includes clear retainers
- Trainers, hoodies and other outside garments are not to be worn in the Academy.

DANCE KIT:

Students are required to wear their Academy PE kit for dance lessons with bare feet or grippy socks.



FREE SCHOOL MEALS

WHO QUALIFIES FOR FREE SCHOOL MEALS?

Your child might be able to get free school meals if you get any of the following:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit. You must also have an an-nual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018, your household income must be less than£7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)



Our careers programme is designed to inspire, challenge, and provide excellent progression routes for all our students. We offer a range of qualifications that are designed to support a successful and rewarding working life. We are a lead school for careers in Dorset and employ two qualified independent level 7 Careers guidance practitioners to provide careers guidance at every step of students' journey. We have outstanding links to industry, locally, nationally and globally and business mentoring is at the heart of our programme. Our careers programme is nationally recognised for its excellence, we hold the "Investors In Careers" award which ensures our careers programme is innovative and robust and is the gold standard for careers provision in the UK. We were also the first school to hit all eight of the Gatsby Bench Marks in the UK, the gold standard of careers.

SIXTH FORM

Our innovative Sixth Form curriculum is designed to inspire, challenge and provide good progression routes for all students. We offer 'real' qualifications that will start you on the road to a successful and rewarding working life.

All of our courses have active links with many universities nationwide, include Russell Group Universities. We also have close links with local and national employers, which will enable students to have a smooth transition into employment or degree programmes. Additionally all of our Sixth Form leavers in 2023 have gone on to study the course of their choice at university and some have gained prestigious Higher Apprenticeships.



THE BOURNE ACADEMY SPONSOR CANFORD SCHOOL

2007, Canford School was In approached by the Department for Education to consider sponsoring an academy (without financial input), by providing expertise, governors and support by sharing Canford's 'culture of excellence'. A key part of the vision, was that it would be at the heart of the community, offering local families an excellent education, new opportunities and facilities available to all. Raising students' expectations, building their self-confidence and teaching them appropriate skills to build a successful career and contribute to society were, and remain, central to The Bourne Academy's aims.



Canford's belief, that a good education depends crucially on the relationships between staff, students, parents and key stakeholders, was another core part of the vision. Mutual support, pride, ambition, trust and high expectations combine to allow impressive academic achievements against a background of respect. The Academy's vision is articulated clearly through the mnemonic ASPIRE: to develop citizens who are Ambitious, Self-confident, Physically literate, Independent, Resilient and Emotionally literate.

Canford School is one of the top independent schools in the country and Academy students have the opportunity to apply for a scholarship to Canford's 6th Form. Since 2011, 18 Academy students have gained a two year scholarship before going on to University.

BOURNE SCHOLARS



In 2021 we introduced our hugely successful Bourne Scholars Programme, for gifted and talented students, as our grammar stream equivalent.

Bourne Scholars work with Canford School and other key partners, including Southampton University and Winchester College, on a programme of curricular and extracurricular opportunities that increases their Cultural Capital and puts them on a path to the world's best universities.

We work with our Scholars to raise their aspirations to perform at the highest level in their chosen areas, facilitating them to become high attaining global citizens. The results are outstanding.
