

(Ambitious, Self-Confident, Physically Literate, Independent, Resilient & Emotionally Literate)

- Our programme follows national best practice, including the **Gatsby Benchmarks** and **CDI Framework**

Strong careers education:


- Is tailored for every individual student

Our Key Priorities

Over the next three years our careers education will focus on:

- 1. Stronger communication with parents and carers**
 - Clear information, events and guidance at key decision points
- 2. Personalised support for every student**
 - Using data to target support where it's needed most
- 3. Careers linked to learning**
 - Showing how school subjects connect to real jobs
- 4. Stronger employer relationships and engagement**
 - Increased meaningful contact with employers, colleges and universities
- 5. High-quality work experience for all**
 - A minimum of 10 days across secondary school (and a further 5 days for those staying on to sixth form).



Parents and carers are key influencers in career decision-making


We will provide:


- Online resources and recorded assemblies
