The beginning of the week

My week of work experience started on the 8th March and I was very lucky to get a placement at Pavilion Dance South West. When I arrived at 9.30am, I was made to feel very welcome and I was introduced to the staff.

After this, I was taken on a tour around the front and back of the building so that I could get used to the grounds and the space I was working in for the rest of the week.

For the rest of the day, I made a start on my arts award (a qualification in performing arts).

Arts Award

Throughout the week, I worked towards achieving my Bronze Arts Award, this included four tasks that I had to complete. The tasks were to explore the arts as a performer, explore the arts as an audience member, evaluate my arts inspiration and to share my skills with a class.

My favourite task was to share my skills as I was able to plan my own lesson before hand and teach a class based around Hip-hop.

The lesson started with a warm up including basic Hip-hop skills so that the class would understand the main task more. We then moved on to the main task which I taught 3 counts of 8, I received positive feedback for my approach as a teacher as I broke down the phrases so that everybody understood. The class was then finished with a cool down where we all stretched out to help our heart and blood return to its original rate.

Due to this experience, I would consider teaching dance in the future. I feel as if taking part in Arts Award was a fantastic opportunity as I will gain a qualification whereas other placements would not offer this.. Not only have I had a great time but I have also gained a lot from it.

The weeks activity

As a kick-start to the week, I was able to take part in the staff contemporary class. As contemporary is my favourite style of dance, I felt comfortable in my surroundings and this was a great way to bond with other members of staff. Throughout the week I assisted PDSW's 'mini movers' classes which was really fun because the children were aged under five and it was great to see such little people focus and enjoy dance.

Although you may associate PDSW with dance, there are also many technical jobs that take place. I was able to help set up the lighting for the Phoenix show and I was really lucky as I got to meet Phoenix's director (Leon). During this task I learnt many new things and enjoyed it very much. I attended the evening show with some other students so it was very rewarding that my friends and I got to see the work I contributed to the show.

Around the middle of the week, I was set a marketing task where had to create a spread sheet based on the data I had found out about other companies prices compared to PDSWs. I think that this was good as I learnt how to transmit data onto Excel.

Towards the end of the week, I taught the 'older and perfect' class which is aimed towards to people over 60. I found it really fun to see the elderly get up and moving, enjoying themselves whilst being out of the house.

On the Friday, I was able to teach a class to people with parkinsons which is when you have a disorder where you cant send messages through your nervous system so find it harder to walk and balance. I loved teaching this class as it was beautiful to see the un-able, able to dance.

Conclusion

Overall I had an amazing week! Everybody was extremely friendly and made me feel as if I were part of the team myself!

From the whole week my most enjoyable moment was working with the Phoenix dance company and teaching classes they are the type of career path I would like to take. If I was to do the week again, I would like to find out a bit more about the marketing as I only had one task on it.

By having different tasks being set for me, I feel as if it has set me up for many different jobs in the future which is useful because I can always have something to lean back on.



The Bourne Academy A unfortunately lost their first game of the day by a close margin to Victoria School's B Team, 241 to 228, but went on to show great team work in a convincing win against Dorchester Middle School, 301 to 249.

The Bourne Academy B had a fantastic start to their day winning both their group games against Carter Community (249 to 227) and Montacute (275 to 182) meaning they finished top of their group, going through to the semi-finals.

Unfortunately home team QE1 who they came up against in the semi-finals managed to knock The Bourne Academy B out with a score line 281 to 239. Although, they managed to get back to winning ways for one last game against the losers of the other semi-finals Corfe Hills, winning by 20 points (280 to 260). Therefore making them third, and **Bronze Medallist's in Dorset.**

Students will be required to complete a Log Book based on the game, to encourage and inspire writing, reading and research.



Miss Lovett, Literacy Coordinator for the English department said "We are very excited to be given this fantastic opportunity for our students. With the highly supportive English team working alongside the specially trained AFC Bournemouth team, our students should make amazing progress throughout the ten weeks."

As part of the programme, 14 students went on a trip to Vitality Stadium where they held a press conference with Callum Wilson, who also signed posters and programmes for the students. Callum emphasised the importance of self-belief in achieving personal goals and spoke about how important reading is for his job, as Eddie Howe writes down key instructions for the team during training and to prepare them for matches.

They also attended a song writing workshop with author Jamie Scallion, who has written for The Script and is the author of '*Rock and Roll Diaries*'. Jamie was very impressed with everyone's writing skills and complemented the students on their ideas.

Finally, students were treated to a tour of the stadium. They visited the home and away changing



THE BIG BANG FAIR

Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths, Numeracy and i-Media

The Big Bang Fair is exactly what it says it is...BIG...and full of every kind of science you can imagine!

Despite a long morning travelling to Birmingham, our Year 9 students arrived wide awake and ready to explore what science was available at their fingertips. There are so many different shows available, as well as interactive activities, that the only way we could experience what was on offer was to split up into smaller groups. Some students went to find out about the mystery of Base (which involved covering speakers in flour and lentils and sending them flying by the power of sound alone), others met author Dr Lewis Dartnell as he explained how to survive and rebuild society









group discovered about the different roles that engineering plays in our everyday lives, including how they work to provide clean water in remote places and design buildings which can survive earthquakes.

Our group were fortunate enough to catch two shows, the first being a talk by Jules Howard from Paleolab. Jules explained that every vertebrate species can be connected through the evolutionary process by matching the similarities in their skeletons, for example, elephant tusks are evolved canine teeth, horse hooves are nothing more than evolved toes and that the base of a human spine is formed of very small tail bones (which explains why it hurts so much when we fall on our bottoms).



The second show we participated in was given by TV presenter The Blowfish (the World's ONLY heavy metal marine biologist) who, in between thrashing some savoury licks on his base guitar, gave us his top 5 countdown of the World's most 'Metal' marine life – the starfish (who can replicate from dismembered body parts), the jellyfish (who can be so toxic that there is no cure), the octopus (highly intelligent with tongues like razorblades), fish of all types (from flatulent herring to the parrot fish and its mucus sleeping bag) and at number 1, the shark (with its electromagnetic wave detecting senses and being the ocean's top predator).





Our day finished with the Hollywood Special Effects show, where we learned how explosions, gunshots and fight scenes are made, were given the recipe for making fake blood (cocoa powder, water and red food colouring) and shown how CGI has changed the world of movies; there was even an appearance from a full size T-Rex skeleton!

Everyone who attended can agree that there was something for everyone, no matter what field of science you were interested in. The Big Bang Fair is definitely an experience!

The Bourne Academy recently welcomed world leading professor Lord Robert Winston (*Professor of Science and Society and Emeritus Professor of Fertility Studies at Imperial College London*) for a day. We invited students from Canford School, Bournemouth University and B&P College students to join us

The Professor talked to our 200 students about the greatest invention of the last 100 years which the students had to debate. He also went on to talk about how babies are the quickest learners and how we learn and pick up new skills.

Professor Winston was very humble about his own success and accreditations, saying that he had picked an area where there was very little research being done so he was able to advance further. He also stated the importance of doing whichever subject you wanted to do as long as you were passionate about it and that success was mainly down to effort, application and collaboration, rather than intelligence.





After the lecture, Professor Winston attended a Scholar's lunch with a selection of Academy students where they continued their debate.

'We were thrilled to welcome Lord Winston to The Bourne Academy where he inspired our students to develop their own exciting careers in the STEM industry' says Mrs Vicky Woodings, Head of Careers and Enterprise. 'This visit was not only a great moment in the history of The Bourne Academy, but also for Bournemouth town – we were extremely lucky to have hosted him for the day.'



NATIONAL CITIZEN SERVICE

The National Citizen Service (NCS) is a once-in-a-lifetime experience open to all 15-17 year olds across England and this summer we want as many young people to join us in having a fun, challenging and rewarding experience.

What is NCS? NCS is a youth empowerment programme that gives 15-17 year olds the chance to channel their independent spirit and take their next steps with confidence.

What does NCS offer? NCS offers young people skills for work and life while taking on exciting challenges, making new friends and contributing to their community. NCS helps teach the skills employers say they are increasingly looking for in candidates: confidence, team-work, problem-solving and leadership skills. It also helps young people frame their skills and experiences for interviews and university applications.

This summer NCS will be delivered over a four week period 27th June-22nd July and 1st-26th August

Week 1 – Residential at Exmoor National Park participating in team building activities such as quad biking, rock climbing, paintballing, surfing and kayaking.

Week 2 – Residential at Bournemouth University Halls, participants will share a flat with friends, budgeting and cooking for themselves, alongside interactive workshops and fun activities.

Week 3 - Based locally and runs 9am – 5pm. This week consists of raising Community Awareness and developing life-skills.

Week 4 - Participants will undertake Social Action Projects in the community making a real difference to people's lives.

Graduation – Participants will be awarded a certificate signed by the Prime Minister at their very own award ceremony.

The programme runs outside of term time and is delivered by a network of quality assured youth and community organisations. The course is heavily subsidised by the government, which means the maximum cost for a place is £50. This fee can be waivered in some cases.






FUNDRAISING AND CHARITY
