ICELAND VISIT

During February half term holiday, staff and students from the science department had the opportunity to explore one of the world's most unique and diverse countries, Iceland.

Their three day trip included visiting 18 different locations in the South Western area of Iceland, including watching the six metre high rolling waves of the Atlantic on the black-sand beaches of Vik, passing the Eyjafjallajökull Volcano to the Sólheimajökull Glacier, and standing below the Skógafoss and Seljalandsfoss waterfalls. Students also watched the sun rise over the Gullfoss Waterfall before witnessing the Strokkur Geysir eruptions at close hand. The adventurous group then travelled down from the Eurasian Plate, across

no-man's land, and walked through a fissure up the front of the American Plate – all topped off with a soak in the Blue Lagoon (which despite being a 65 mph blizzard and minus 5 degrees outside, the 37 degree warmth of the pool soon made up for it).

An evening walk through Reykjavik, to the Hallgrímskirkja concluded their last evening of scientific exploration into how biology, chemistry and physics interconnect in extreme and unique environmental conditions to ensure the survival of life.

ASPIRE DAY GLOBAL DEMOCRACY

During our democracy themed Aspire Day, several dozen students had the pleasure of meeting David Stokes – the Labour candidate for Bournemouth West. For the duration of the presentation, Mr Stokes endorsed the value of voting and how different parties have different policies that will greatly affect the public's lives, and that it is important to vote for the party with whom we share values.



Explanations were given re how a Member of Parliament (MP) is vot-

ed in by the local area for which they represent and that they go to the House of Commons to discuss the policies which they want to change, e.g. debt caused by university loans. The point of voting is to pick the party that will best suit the policies with which the individual agrees.

After the voting and discussion, Mr Stokes submitted himself for questions, but there seemed to be very few based on his elaborate explanations. However, he then began filling time by going over some of labour's policies. For example, eradicating the bedroom tax, assisting the NHS, making homes more affordable and increasing employment. The experience was very reassuring in that it made it feel like not EVERY politician is a psychotic lunatic, and that he is someone who cares for the people of the country.

TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING & DESIGN

In TED, the Year 11 resistant materials students have prepared for summer by completing their Barbecue Projects.

Cardboard prototypes were used to establish design concepts and final work pieces were then fabricated from aluminium using traditional engineering workshop tools. A final polish with steel wool and the barbecues were gleaming and ready for the bangers.

Meanwhile Year 12 and 13 engineering students have been honing their electronics skills. Using Circuit Wizard software they have designed their own amplifier circuits and have gone on to build these using the TED department's Printed Circuit Board (PCB) Etch Tank.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

FRANCISCO ESPINO from ARGENTINA

My name is Francisco Espino, I am a 15 year old from Cordoba in central Argentina and I am currently doing an exchange program in England. I came here to improve my English Your culture is amazing and I must quote Mrs. Bennett, *'What better place to come to learn English, than England!'*

What did you expect to get out of your trip to England and The Bourne Academy?

What I expected the most was to be able to gain new skills and to be more fluent in my spoken English. I was also looking forward to making friends and experience the day-to-day of an English school, which is amazing because most of the stuff you do here, the way you behave, we just see in the movies because our schools in Argentina are totally different.

How socially different is England to Argentina?

Argentina is currently going through hard times. We have a socialist government which has implemented

very high taxes of 35% and we have very high unemployment and homelessness, which sadly is a large proportion of the population. We even have a black market for foreign currency, because it is difficult to get it from the bank, because you need permission from the Government. So yeah, you are very blessed being British!

Are there differences between your school in Argentina and The Bourne Academy?

Yes there are loads, it's totally different. For example exams are different. In Argentina we don't have percentages, we have plain numbers from 1 to 10 and you need to get an average of 6 in each term. Also we don't wear a uniform and do not have to dress smart (*at all*). We call the teachers by their first name and we develop an attitude in which we don't fear saying things to them upfront. Here that could be considered as dis-respectful but I think that you need to find a way of expressing yourself with an adult without sounding rude. So basically I think if a British student visited Argentina they would think that we are really rude, but it is just how we behave in school and how things work there.

What lessons are you enjoying the most?

I enjoy most of them but I must say that Psychology has become my favourite subject as well as French and History, they are just great.

What could we learn from you?

I honestly think that The Bourne Academy is amazing, I really enjoy It. My classmates are great, teachers are amazing and they really care about your learning. I love how the educational system works here and I think that we could learn from you, not you from us!

What ideas will you take back home with you?

I will take loads! I will have to get used to my laid-back school, like calling teachers by their first name, wearing regular clothing, not having a bell that goes when the break is over. I

think that I will come back with a lot of feedback to my Argentinean school. We should be more organised, when it's break time in my school the whole thing is just chaotic, kids in the corridors running and screaming and here it's all so well regulated and neat, I really like it.

Will you want to return to England?

Of course! I need to sort out visas, which are really hard to get in Argentina, but hopefully, I will come back... if you would have me! Thank you for a wonderful experience Bourne Academy.
