### IGCSE ENGLISH

Before half term, 92 year 11 students completed an intensive three days of written coursework, speaking and listening assessments and exam revision in order to secure their GCSE English Language grade early. The Academy worked in collaboration with Winton Arts and Media College to ensure all students had access to computers and all staff supported to ensure English was prioritised for this time.

The results so far are outstanding: In the written coursework (which counts for 40% of the final grade) 91% of students gained a C grade or above and 35% gained an A or an A\*. In the speaking and listening coursework (which counts for 20% of the final grade) 90% of students gained a C or above and 30% gained an A or an A\*. These grades and sample pieces are currently with the exam board to moderate our marking.

The results for the exam (which counts for 40%) are



released on 23<sup>rd</sup> January and we hope that a high percentage of students will have made the expected progress and gain the overall grade needed in English Language. In the meantime, students will continue fully with the AQA course until we are certain of their grade; this includes completing their English Language Unit 1 exam in January.

The English team would like to thank parents, Heads of Houses and WAAMC for their support and all of the teaching staff for allowing students out of their lessons during this time. Most importantly, we would like to thank the students for their hard work and excellent behaviour. We know that this exemplary attitude will continue until June.

Equipped with a new computer chip in his brain, it looks like Tom might actually become somebody. But what happens when you start to question the rules?



### Bullet Boys by Ally Kennen

*Bullet Boys* is a gripping, desperate story about boys, girls, guns and choices. Alex, son of a gamekeeper, He knows all about guns; their danger and their value. Levi knows nothing of guns but is good with girls. Rebel Max is fighting everything. Sasha is coping with teen parenthood. . When they uncover a stash of hidden guns on an Army training base things get very dangerous indeed.

A powerful combination of historic detail, timeless narrative, and action-packed plot. 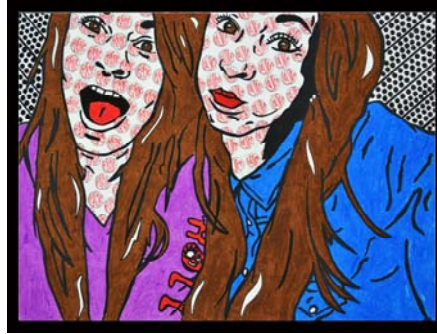

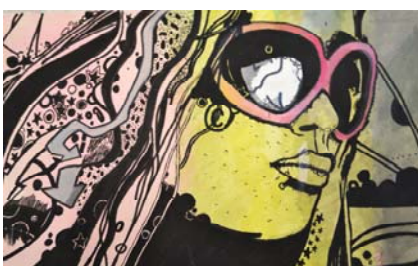

## Portland House Fundraising for Teenage Cancer Trust

On Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> November, Beth Bartlam (Regional Fundraiser) from the Teenage Cancer Trust visited the Academy and Portland's House assembly to receive a cheque for **£438**. This money was raised by students in Portland House when we did our Portland Walk from Bournemouth Pier to Sandbanks back in July 2012. It was Aaron Blandford (Year 11 P3) who suggested that this would be a good charity to support and the rest of the House agreed. Before we did our walk in the summer, Lindsay Wilson, Education and Advocacy Manager from the Teenage Cancer Trust visited us at school to talk about the work of the charity and inspired us to raise as much sponsorship money as we could.

Beth Bartlam was very pleased with the cheque and thanked all the staff and students for their fundraising efforts. She explained that the Teenage Cancer Trust is entirely funded by voluntary donations, so gifts like ours make an enormous difference to their work. During the assembly Beth explain that a brand new ten bed Teenage Cancer Trust unit will be opening at Southampton General Hospital. This unit will bring young cancer patients between 16 and 24 together so they can be treated alongside each other in an environment tailored to their needs. Until now this age group would have been treated on a children's ward or alongside the elderly, which can be both lonely and isolating. Beth said that thanks to our generous support they are a step closer to reaching the 2.4 million target to build the unit.

We hope to welcome the Teenage Cancer Trust back into school to lead some workshops with each of the Portland Tutor groups and we will be continuing with our fundraising so we can help teenagers in our area who are suffering with Cancer. There are a group of Portland students who will be leading the House's fundraising activities so we can raise even more money for the Teenage Cancer Trust.

## OUTSTANDING CARE AT THE ACADEMY BY OFSTED 2012

The Bourne Academy has just had its first full Ofsted inspection. Throughout their two day visit in November, the inspectors scrutinised documents, observed lessons and met with the Principal, staff, students and members of the Governing body. Ofsted judged that the Academy is a good school in all respects except attainment, which is on course for very good results this summer.

The inspectors judged that 'the proportion of students attaining five or more GCSE A\* to C grades rose significantly this year, and that 'students' achievement in mathematics is consistently good. The school's policy of entering students early for GCSE mathematics has a positive impact in raising their aspirations and attainment.'

Ofsted judged 'the quality of teaching at the Academy is good' and 'the school's approach to raising standards in literacy is highly effective.' 'Teachers have a very secure grasp of students' progress and attainment over time. Most teachers use this knowledge to plan and adjust lesson activities that meet the needs of the whole group well. Teachers' effective use of questioning makes sure the whole class is involved in the learning.'

Ofsted found students to be courteous and well behaved: 'The behaviour and safety of students are good' and 'the way in which the staff cares for the students is outstanding. Students behave well, and the older students say that behaviour has been transformed since the Academy opened.' The report also stated that 'attendance has risen dramatically and is a direct result of effective working with the educational welfare office, excellent pastoral support through the house system and is also a reflection of students' own eagerness to learn.'

In terms of leadership and management, Ofsted praised the leadership of the Academy, stating that: 'Strong leadership has driven the academy's improvement from an exceptionally low base so that it is now well on the way to becoming good. The Academy has recently made excellent appointments in English and Science, as a result, middle leadership is strong in most areas.'

'The governing body, chaired by the deputy headteacher of Canford School, the academy's sponsor, brings invaluable expertise. Governors have a very accurate view of the quality of education provided by the academy, including the quality of teaching.'

Ofsted also thought that the Academy uses its resources well, including for students eligible for the government's additional funding, the pupil premium. The inspectors found that 'the good use of this funding is helping to raise the attainment' of eligible students. They found that there is a good balance of academic and vocational courses and more students than before are pursuing the English Baccalaureate qualification.'

The Academy is really pleased that Ofsted have seen how good a school it is and how much students and staff work together to make every single day count.
