'THE BOURNE ACADEMY HAS MADE 'GOOD' PROGRESS RAISING ATTAINMENT' AND THAT'S OFFICIAL—OFSTED

Elements of the Ofsted Report read as follows:-

- The Academy has already had a positive impact in raising attainment..
- Progress in mathematics has accelerated rapidly.
- The rate of progress at the early stages of learning English, is accelerating due to specialist curriculum provision.
- Students' attitudes and behaviour have improved very dramatically in the academy's first year.

 There has also been a sharp decline in bullying.
- The curriculum is broadening rapidly to be more inclusive and to better meet the needs of a
 wider range of students. The range of courses offered, including vocational qualifications is
 impressive given the academy's small size.

OSILIGI MAASAI WARRIOR TROUP VISIT THE ACADEMY WRITTEN BY ADAM MOORE (year 7)

On the 18th October 2011, The Maassi Warriors from Kenya came to perform at The Bourne Academy. They were from a tribe and their name means Hope. They can jump 4 feet in the air and they chanted traditional Kenyan songs. Their customs are unusual because they mix blood with milk and can kill lions with their bare hands.

They also showed us how they herd their cattle with special chants and whistles. They chose students and teachers from the audience including Mr Storey who jumped higher then the warriors did. The students jumped and chanted with the warriors. The warriors came to show us what life is like as a Massai and to show us their culture which was really different and interesting.



The Maasai are one of the poorest tribes in Kenya. Life is hard, infant mortality high and drinking water rarely clean. Their lifestyle is one of the oldest surviving tribal traditions. In the past, theywere nomadic pastoralists, roaming with their cattle. Now, much of their land is tourist game reserves and fenced off. The Maasai say that they must adapt to prevent starvation of their people. School was unnecessary now they want a good education to have doctors, engineers & teachers.

The students learnt how to communicate with the Langside student using sign language or simple verbal skills to encourage the Langside students to try and clap or to express how they were feeling.

The event was a very enjoyable experience and students realize the challenges you can face when dealing with someone who cannot speak or is unable to move. The Bourne Academy students were very professional and produce excellent pieces of dances with the Langside students.


MOUNTAIN BIKING WRITTEN BY MIKEY BARTLETT (YEAR 7)
