Engineering is one of the Academy's specialisms and the visit was designed to inspire more students into a career in engineering, particularly as there is a huge demand for more engineering apprentices.

A selection of year 10 and 11 students who are studying Engineering were chosen to greet the helicopter and its pilots. Mr Storey, Head of Engineering said, "In many respects the Apache aircraft is at the cutting edge of engineering excellence; the combination of on board technology, electronics, aerodynamics and communications ensures that it remains at the

forefront of UK military capability. We want all of our engineering students to aspire to be the very best and shape the future of engineering in the UK.

The Academy is already developing engineering excellence; over the past year the Engineering Team, the Bourne Engineers, guided by their teachers built and raced their own electric car – **The Bourne Bullet**.

MUSIC LESSONS AT THE ACADEMY

The Bourne Academy Music Department is delighted to offer students the opportunity of additional music lessons, taught by a specialist visiting teacher, to study the following:-

- Woodwind (flute, clarinet, saxophone) The Academy has a limited number of woodwind instruments available for loan but ideally students should obtain their own..
- Piano/Keyboard
- Percussion (drum kit)
- Singing lessons
- Guitar (electric & acoustic) and Bass Guitar









We expect places to be in great demand, so places will be offered on a first come first served basis. If your child is not successful this term for their chosen instrument, then an alternative instrument may be offered. If you decide not take up the opportunity, then your cheque will be returned and you may reapply the following term.

The charge for tuition will be £50 per term which will cover a series of 10 weekly lessons (at least 20 minutes each lesson). We are aware that for some families, the cost of tuition may be prohibitively expensive and for those students who are eligible for free school meals, we are therefore setting aside a limited amount of funding to support the costs of music lessons.

Students will normally be taught in pairs although they may be in groups of up to four, where appropriate. It is important to note that all students taking up this offer will be expected to meet the expected standards of practice, progress and attendance, as well as to catch up on any work missed in their other lessons. Compliance with these requirements will be reviewed prior to the start of each term.

If your child decides to take up lessons then he/she will be expected to join a lunchtime club where they will practice as an ensemble for future performances.

SOUTHAMPTON MOSQUE AND WINCHESTER CATHEDRAL

The Imam at the mosque was enlightened by the questions asked by our students and we were shown many areas of the mosque, including the mortuary where they prepared their loved ones before a funeral.















The Winchester Cathedral is a stunning place of worship. Originally built as a church in 648, became a cathedral in 676 when the seat of the Bishop transferred to Winchester. The building of the Cathedral started in 1079 and was consecrated in 1093, after the old church was demolished. Over the years, the buildings were remodelled, destroyed, rebuilt and restored and to this day, funds are raised for the upkeep of this fantastic building.
